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ALIVE PROGRAM

PRS's ALIVE Program stands for **A**dults for **L**earning and growing. Integration in the community, **V**ocations of choice, **E**nthusiasm for life. This vital service in Plumas County provides training and support for adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Trained staff and a supportive group environment enable participants to hold paying jobs, become involved in community activities, use community resources, increase independent living skills and develop self-advocacy. ALIVE is committed to helping people live productive, enriching lives.

ALIVE teaches employment skills for those who want to be employed in the community. Staff offer job interest/skills assessments, assistance applying for jobs, on-the-job training, support in the workplace, and help with job skills and self employment. ALIVE has recently launched a new Paid Internship Program (PIP) which is designed to enhance job skills and experience for local adults with developmental delays and give local businesses a chance to see if hiring diversified staff is right for them. Far Northern Regional Center pays employee wages during their participation with PIP.

ALIVE staff provide one-on-one support for those who live independently, including assistance with cooking and cleaning, money management, home safety, and relationship and sex education.

To support community integration, ALIVE's day service provides educational classes in group settings both on site at PRS and in the community. Participants receive support with self-advocacy, housing search, volunteer activities, recreational outings, health and exercise programs, bike and pedestrian safety, utilizing public transportation, and how to access community resources such as the library, post office, banks, college, and local stores.

She likes getting to work with people and be a part of helping people have the opportunity to do things they wouldn't be able to do otherwise. "I like supporting people, both consumers and staff," she says. "As a Coordinator, I'm able to assist staff in their efforts with consumers as well. I like working with people

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and being someone others can come to for support individually and as a team."

Mary will be growing in the leadership ranks at PRS again this month. She is moving into a Program Services Manager position, having oversight of the Domestic Violence Services, WIC, Visions, Trauma Recovery & Education, and Mindful Living programs at the agency. She is a part of the PRS Leadership Team and looks forward to spending time learning more about programs at PRS outside of the ALIVE program and getting to work with Coordinators that provide such diversity of services. She is excited to be more deeply involved in the breadth of critical services the agency offers. The agency will benefit greatly from Mary's dedication and commitment to supporting staff in their efforts to serve their communities
